On 28 September almost 90 Fellows, Members and Guests attended the 5 pm presentation by Jean Voruz. He also showed us from 1 pm onwards some top items from his exceptional collection. On 9 November, a new chapter in the history of the Royal was opened. For the first time ever, we had a speaker who introduced us to the philately of El Salvador. I am very pleased (and a little emotional too) to introduce our new home to you today.

We have acquired a rare freehold in the City of London and intend to move there in June 2019. The building has always been a club and is presently occupied by the London Capital Club which will be vacating the premises on 31st July 2018.

The building consists of five storeys above ground level and two basement levels. While it's approximately 20% bigger than Devonshire Place, it is in fact a lot more spacious because the rooms are better laid out, so that there are fewer wasted spaces, and the most important difference is the ... LIFT. Since it is almost next door to Bank Underground Station, it is within easy reach for everyone.

Although the practical aspects like the size of the rooms and the accessibility are important features, and were the major reasons to sell 41 Devonshire Place, we nevertheless loved our previous home because of its character and charming Georgian atmosphere. Moving to a new home without a similar 'heart and soul' was inconceivable. I am therefore more than happy that our new home is also a listed building with a truly British (late Victorian) atmosphere. I have no doubt it will cast the same spell on you as did 41 Devonshire Place.

So, we have magnificent plans. What we'd like most of all would be to completely refurbish 'Our New Home' before our move. New RPSL Publication: Perkins Bacon Great Britain Line-Engraved Postage Stamp Printing 1840-1846 by Alan Druce FRPSL.

After five years of meticulous research in archives, this definitive book is now ready for publication. As well as the Perkins Bacon Records and the Postal Museum, many hours have been spent looking at primary sources in the British Library, the Victoria & Albert Museum and the National Archives at Kew. The information gleaned has been meticulously analysed and the full story told in more detail than ever before. The work is in two hard-bound volumes, each of 624 pages. It is Volume 2 that will be heavily used by aficionados of GB Line-Engraved stamps as it contains tables that define precisely how many sheets were printed from which plate by which printer on which day. These volumes give philatelists a previously un-published level of detail of the first six years of stamp production.

The books will be printed over the summer, and it is anticipated that they will be available for the first meeting of the new season. The normal retail price of this two-volume book will be £125, however a special price reduction is available to anyone who orders by 23 July 2018. The price before that date is £112 to non-members and £99 to RPSL members. From 24 July 2018, the members' price will be £112.
